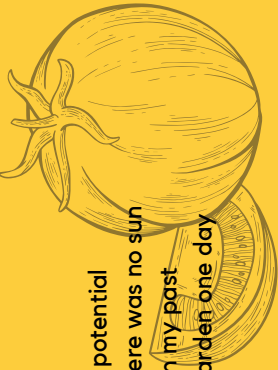

guarantee me money. (At that time I could've easily recited the salaries of an engineer, lawyer, and eye doctor. Thanks to those speeches)

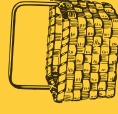
